Staplehurst school promotes positive attendance and punctuality at school. This remains a high priority for the safety and wellbeing of all of our pupils and staff. Celebration of Attendance:

At Staplehurst school, we believe it is important to recognise and celebrate good attendance and punctuality, which are extremely important life skills. We celebrate attendance in the following ways:

- Weekly Attendance Cup KS2- the class with the best attendance & punctuality for that week are awarded with an attendance cup during the weekly celebration assembly.
- KS1 Attendance Ted the KS1 class with the best attendance and punctuality for that week are awarded with 'Attendance Ted'.
- Class 100% Weekly Prize the class who achieves 100% attendance in a week will be rewarded an additional prize during the weekly celebration assembly.
- Individual reward for weekly and full term 100% attendance certificates will be awarded to these children in a Celebration of Attendance Assembly.

IMPORTANT UPDATE

EYFS



The children in Early Years had a very exciting visit on Friday last week. We had the Maidstone Fire brigade bring one of their fire engines to school! The children were able to ask the firefighters questions about their job and what equipment they needed. The children got to hold a hose and even sat in the back of the fire engine!

This was a fantastic visit and introduced this terms topic of people who help us. We thought about the different circumstances we might need a firefighter, what equipment they needed and we reflected on our visit from them.

The children have produced brilliant writing including list writing of the equipment used by firefighters, descriptive writing of a fire engine and reflective writing on our visit. They used their phonic knowledge of using their fred fingers and a soundmat to help them hear all the sounds in each of the words.


In the garden we built our own fire engines using the crates, tyres and wheels.

In math's this week we have focussed on the numbers 4 and 5. We have been finding, subitising and representing 4 and 5.











This week we received a letter of help from a girl called Rapunzel! We found out all about her story and we have been learning to tell the story out loud to each other.

For our geography topic, we have been learning the 7 contintents. We have been singing a catchy song and we completed a tricky map of placing the 7 continents in the correct positions.

In maths, we have been continuing our learning about fact families. Using what we know already to help us to solve subtraction problems.

P.E this term is focusing on dance, so we have been learning to move our body in time with music, and holding shapes. The children have been very creative in making low ground shapes, tall shapes and also adding in movements to connect shapes like jumps or spins.













Year 2 have continued the addition and subtraction unit in maths this week. The children have enjoyed using a 100 square to help them add and subtract two 2-digit numbers when crossing over ten.

In science we looked at different materials and their properties. We went on a hunt around the classroom to spot objects that have been created from those materials.

Within English we have been looking at past tense and how to write sentences in the past tense. We also started our new text 'Vlad and the Great Fire', which goes alongside our new history topic on The Great Fire of London.







Year 3 have found themselves being introduced to the Iron Man by Ted Hughes in their English lessons this week. They have read the story to find out what he looks like, before planning a non-chronological report about him. Children have also begun their new humanities unit, which is history this term. The will be investigating 'How has industry in Kent changed over time?' They begun by looking at map and photos of Staplehurst from the past and present. Within science, Year 3 have considered the importance of a balanced diet, by identifying the different food groups.
















YEAR 3






Staplehurst School put in a strong performance on the road but ultimately came up short in a well-contested match against Park Way.

From the outset, Staplehurst took control, dominating possession and creating early chances. Reggie Taylor and Reggie Edwards communicated well in the opening periods, keeping the team organized at the back. Mason Patrice made some threatening runs down the wing in the first half, adding pressure to Park Way's defense, but despite their efforts, Staplehurst couldn't quite find the finishing touch to take an early lead.

As the first half wore on, Park Way found their rhythm and managed to break through, with their striker scoring on a quick counter-attack. Before the break, James came on and quickly looked a threat, showing composure on the ball and helping Staplehurst press forward. Meanwhile, Oliver Gilbert made a few crucial saves to keep Staplehurst in the game, preventing Park Way from extending their lead.

Early in the second half, Staplehurst's efforts paid off when Jacob scored a well-worked equalizer. The play began with a precise ball from Oliver out wide to Braxton Santer, who delivered a perfect cross for Jacob to slot home. Seconds later, however, Park Way struck again, quickly restoring their lead and deflating Staplehurst's momentum.

The team continued to push, with Riley Coleman-Reeves running hard throughout and Ben, the captain for the first time, battling in the middle of the pitch. Despite their efforts, Park Way's counter-attacking threat remained strong, and they continued to press, hitting both posts and forcing Oliver into several more fine saves.

In the final moments, Park Way sealed the win with a third goal, ending Staplehurst's hopes of a comeback.




Remembrance Day Readers
