
Attendance

This week the children have been reflecting on the learning they have done over this term about people who help us. We read 'A Superhero Like You' by Ranj Singh. The children thought about which 'superhero' they would like to be when they grow up and why. The children produced some brilliant writing about what they wanted to be.

The children then thought about what jobs people in their families do and what they had to do in their jobs.

Following our White Rose maths learning the children have been subitising and representing 0-5. Using a range of manipulatives such as fives frames and unifix cubes the children have been able to represent all numbers from 0-5 in a multitude of ways.

The children have enjoyed using the garden this week despite the cold weather! We have been using our phonics knowledge to make different words using the jelly letters and then writing them on to a chalkboard.






This week, we reflected on our learning this term in Art to create our own self-portraits. We applied our understanding of whispering and shouting lines to sketch facial features, paying special attention to the shapes of our eyes and noses. Using mirrors, we observed our features closely and thought about how to represent them on paper. Then, we used our

knowledge of the colour wheel to mix shades for our skin, eye, and hair colours. Their dedication truly paid off, resulting in wonderful self-portraits.

























Over this week the children have been practicing different balances within PE. They impressed us with their coordination skills. We have spoke about how to kick a ball using the side of our feet to help with control.

On Friday, Year 2 enjoyed their Art day where they made a clay tiles of a house with a focus on making different textures. The children used a range of different tool to help them achieve their desired effects. We were very impressed with their final pieces. Here are some examples of their work.









This week Year 3 have planned and begun writing their own calligram poem based on an animal. They have considered their choice of adjectives, verbs and similes to draft poems based on the appearance, behaviour and environment of their chosen animal (tiger, squirrel or giraffe).

In history, as they continue their study of how industry has changed over time in Kent, Year 3 focused on the changes in Margate. Which was once a thriving fishing village and is now a commercial town on the north Kent coast.

Year 3 have also been enthusiastically practicing the songs for the KS2 Christmas Concert. They are already showing their confidence in singing the year group performance of Away in a Manger.

They have concluded the week with a DT day, where they applied their learning of levers to make a Christmas card with a moving part.





Year 4




YEAR 3

Year 4 have started their new book in English - The Rhythm of the Rain by Grahame Baker-Smith. This lovely picture book tells the story of a drop of water as it passed through the water cycle. The children have been writing expanded noun phrases about the different things the drop of water encounters along its way. It was lovely to use adjectives linked to animals, natural and human features along the way.

In science, the children learnt about all the processes involved in the Water cycle: evaporation, condensation, precipitation and transpiration. They were amazed to find out that they are drinking the same water that dinosaurs drank!

Our geography lesson this week was about flooding, linking to the water cycle. The children learn about the human and physical causes of flood as well as the effects flooding can have.

We are very excited to be finishing our week with our DT day. We are making biscuits and designing to the packaging for our biscuits. Its going to be a fun day!




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


YEAR 5

Year 5 had a really productive DT this week, working out how to move tomatoes from the side of a mountain to the bottom. The real life problem has been identified in Nepal by India and China, where farmers need to move crops such as tomatoes safely. We discussed the cost of food and how losing part of the crops due to damage whilst climbing down the mountain can make a huge difference to people from the region. Using knowledge of pulleys and loads the classes successfully made transporting their crop down the mountain with ease. Using a range of tools - saws, scissors knives and glue/tape helped enable the project to come together













Year 6 completed their Art Day at the end of last week. Across the day, the children designed and built their own Benin Bronzes using clay. The children used different techniques to create variety of shapes for their models. Look at the brilliant outcomes!

On a wet and boggy Friday afternoon, Staplehurst School hosted Park Way in the cup, determined to avenge their league defeat. As soon as the school bell rang, the whistle blew, and Staplehurst got off to a lightning start.

Freya, making her debut for the school team, opened the scoring in style. Skipping past two defenders, she smashed the ball into the bottom corner, giving Staplehurst the dream start. Moments later, Mason doubled the lead, curling a delightful effort into the bottom corner after more excellent team play.

Staplehurst dominated the early exchanges, but Park Way gradually found their rhythm. Their central midfielder, a standout from the league fixture, caused problems with powerful runs and long-range efforts. Oliver in goal made a series of key saves, and the defence stood firm. However, Park Way's persistence paid off when their striker broke through and slotted into the bottom left corner, making it 2-1.

With the first half winding down, Staplehurst struck again. A well-worked move saw Freya release Ben, who found Mason. His deflected shot nestled into the net, restoring the two-goal cushion at 3-1.

The second half was a different story as Park Way came out determined. Staplehurst struggled to push forward, and Park Way capitalised, scoring early to make it 3-2. A free kick moments later led to an equaliser, as their striker headed in, levelling the game at 3-3.

With a minute left, Mason hit the post, and Oliver made a heroic save to tip a free kick onto the bar, sending the game to penalties.

After three penalties each the teams could not be separated and In a heart breaking suddendeath shootout, Park Way emerged victorious.

Despite the result, Staplehurst can be proud of their efforts. Thank you to the parents who braved the conditions to cheer on the team. On to Term 3!
