#### **School Closure Procedures**

In the event of an unplanned school closure, children's learning will be prioritised via remote learning; we will be sending out more details about this shortly. We have clear processes in place to ensure that all children continue to receive high-standards of learning throughout the closure.



This week in EYFS the children have enjoyed learning about different garden birds. They have been writing their own bird fact booklets about these birds and drawing them using pastels.

The children have also enjoyed the story of The Ugly Duckling. After listening to the story, we thought of ways to cheer up the poor duckling. During exploring time some of the children wrote their ideas down. It is wonderful to see the children using their sounds and becoming more independent in their sentence writing.

The children have particularly enjoyed using the garden this week. They have been making their own bird feeders after our science lesson learning about a birds diet. They have also been making bird hides using the crates and other construction materials outside.







It has been a busy week for year 1! We had an amazing science visitor on Monday who talked to us about how animals use camouflage to protect themselves from predators. We looked at some fascinating pictures to see if we could spot them! Then we designed our own butterflies, making sure that they were symmetrically and could camouflage in to a patterned background.

In maths, we have been learning how to build the teen numbers using diennes (A tower of ten) and ones, We have explored representing numbers using tens frames too.

In our science lesson this week, we looked at objects and sorted them based on if they were rough, smooth, soft or hard. We thought carefully about what the material was and how we could describe it using out scientific vocabulary.















This week in English Year 2 have been learning about the four different sentence types (questions, statements, questions and exclamations) and practiced writing their own sentences for each through a range of activities.

In maths we have continued to use addition and subtraction to work out the total value of an amount of money. We have also used 'greater than', 'less than' and 'equal to' to compare different values.

During our geography lesson, the children explored the seas of the world by using maps and labelling. We also compared oceans and seas with the similarities and differences.

In Computing the children used the '2Sequence' program to explore, edit and combine sounds to make music digitally! We enjoyed listening to each other's music tracks.













Year 3 have begun their new geography unit answering the question 'Why is the weather different in different parts of the world?' Children have used world maps to identify the world's continents, seas, the equator, North Pole, South Pole, Northern hemisphere and Southern hemisphere.

Within English, Year 3 have begun their study on the text Nothing but Trouble by Alan Macdonald, which addresses prejudice within communities. Children have identified what prejudice is and considered how people can be prejudice towards others and how we can overcome this.

In DT children have begun to investigate board games, as part of their market research. They considered the aims of games, the target audience, as well as their similarities and

differences. In ICT children have begun to learn what an email is and how to begin to write one.













# YEAR 3

Year 4 have had an exciting start to their music this term. After lunch the children found an envelope in their classroom which said 'Watch this' with a link to a video online. The children watched the video as instructed and then they decided they should next open the letter and see what it said. The letter said that they, at English National Opera, know our Year 4 children had the skills needed to fulfil the task – "you have bold ideas and big imaginations, and, most importantly, you all possess the most important tools for any composer — determination, and the belief that anything is possible!"

The children read on to find out what the challenge was. It appeared that one of their composers had gone missing in the middle of composing a piece of music and the ENO wanted us to finish the piece of music!! Each child got to wear a lanyard that said 'Composer' as they watched the video again and analysed the composer's actions and body language to begin to understand the task involved. Next week the children will start using their own ideas to create a theme for the music.







On Thursday Year 4 had their first taste of Outdoor Learning. All children were very excited when they came to school and even more excited when they were getting changed and being given wellies to wear. We began the session in the Outdoor Learning tent, answering true or false questions about rivers. The children had remembered so much of their rivers learning they got so many questions right! The class was split into 4 groups and each was given a rope, they were tasked with making a river feature out of the rope so that other teams could guess what it was. We had an amazing confluence, source, meander and river mouth that demonstrated the children's learning. They children were then asked to hunt for name labels of rivers and a matching information card. Finally the fire was lit and each child got to toast and eat a marshmallow on the fire. It was a thoroughly enjoyable 90 minutes and we all cant wait for the next time!













# YEAR 5

Year 5 tasted bread fir research in DT this week. We tasted 6 different types of bread - wholemeal with seeds, farmhouse white, sourdough, tortilla, pitta and bagels. We discussed the texture, appearance, taste, origin as well as our own thoughts on what we had tried. Some of the children really liked some of the flavours, whereas others seemed bland or sour. The texture too made an impact with the wholemeal bread being the least liked due to the seeds.










This week Year 6 took part in a science workshop about the heart and circulation. The children took part in a science lesson, learning lots of fun facts about the heart before they had the opportunity to dissect a heart. The children used tools to search for heartstrings within the heart and identify chambers and valves within the heart.
