EYFS



The children in Early Years had a very exciting end to last week. We were able to go and explore the new outdoor learning area. Whilst there the children had four activities to complete.

Our first activity was using chopsticks to make a nest for the bird. The children used chopsticks as we discussed that birds do not have hands to use when they are build nests so we were pretending to have a beak. We even had some wiggly worms to collect!

Our next activity was to find different animals in the woodland area. We worked together to mark off all the animals on the sheet as we found them. We did notice one animal didn't belong in the woods, it was a crocodile!

Our penultimate activity was probably most of the children's favourite. We went on a bug hunt. We had paintbrushes to tickle any animals we found to help us put them into the pots. Each of our pots had a magnifying glass on the top so we could closely examine the different bugs we found. We had to move logs, wood and mats to look underneath to try and find all the bugs. We even found a frog and a wood mouse!

To finish the session our final activity was using mirrors to see different colours from the trees and the sky whilst looking at the reflection. We grouped our mirrors together on the floor to create one giant reflection and we could see all the way to the top of the trees!





Year 1



This week in year 1, we have been learning to retell the story of Beegu, using a story map. We have started to learn each part of the story and to write a sentence for each part, remembering to use finger spaces, capital letters and full stops. We have been trying to use our 'Fred fingers' when sounding out words for our writing.

In Maths, we have begun using a part, part whole model to help us to know the composition of a number. The children have had lots of opportunities for practice Maths using the cubes and counters. We are beginning to use this to help solve simple addition problems.

In Geography, we have been looking at the difference of an aerial photo and a map. We have looked at what we can identify in a photo, such as cars in a carpark which we cannot see on a map.





This week Year 1 have also enjoyed an exciting outdoor learning experience. They learnt about different types of trees, how squirrels hide their food and how to print leaves using fabric and hammers.











Year 2



This week in year 2 the children have begun to write a story setting for our book, Katie in London, they have used adjectives to describe landmarks in London such as the London Eye and The Tower of London. We have also looked at maps of London as part of our geography unit comparing the city of


London with the village of London. The children loved finding landmarks they knew on our aerial maps.

In maths as well as counting in 2s, 5s and 10s we have also continued to learn our number bonds to ten, sometimes we watch videos and sing songs to help us learn!

In RE we have learnt about what followers of Islam believe about how the Qur'an was first written and created a storyboard to show the different parts of the story. In science we have continued to monitor our bean plants and have shown different ways of presenting the data around how the beans grew.

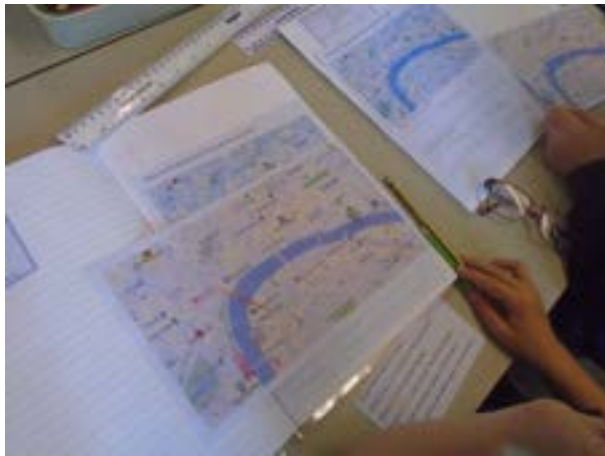

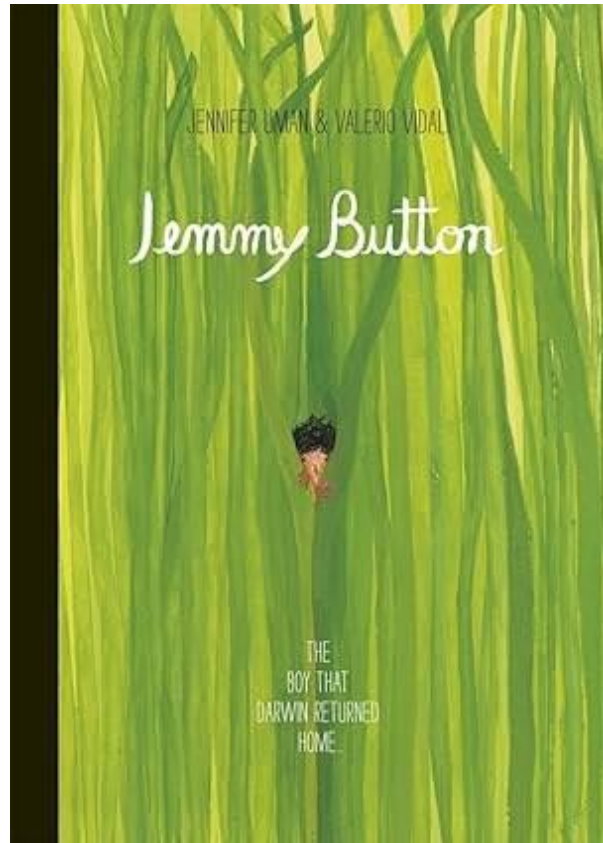
Year 3



This week Year 3 have begun a scientific enquiry to investigate whether all plants need the same things to grow. Each class has a 2 plants: parsley and a cactus. 100 ml of water was added to each plant and left in sunlight, for the children to observe what happened to each plant over the next couple of weeks.

In geography, children have this week learnt about 4 figure grid references when looking at an OS map of Tonbridge, in preparation for their fieldwork visit to the town.

Within English lessons, children have started a new text called *Jemmy Button* by Valerio Vidali. This book is inspired by the life of Jemmy Button - a native of Tierra del Fuego who was brought to England in the mid-1800s to be 'educated' and 'civilised' by Captain Robert FitzRoy. The book illustrates Jemmy's bizarre encounters and his return back home.

Year 4

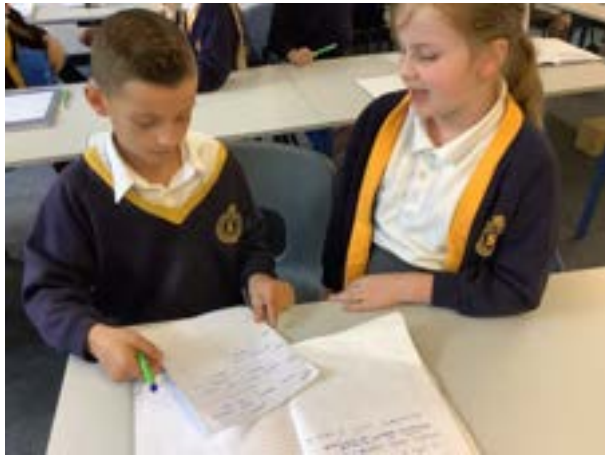


YEAR 3

Year 4 have had an exciting week this week. We are all thorough enjoying our 3 minute movement breaks that happen at regular intervals in the day. They give us a chance to get up, move around and get a drink if we need, and then we are refreshed and ready for the next lesson. We have a lot of fun but also know that when it's over we sit down quietly ready to listen.

In English this week we have been role playing as Harmony and a reporter who has come to interview her about her latest incident - a bike accident. We took turns being Harmony and the reporter and asked thoughtful questions using question words. We were able to empathise with Harmony and answer the reporter's questions really putting ourselves in Harmony's shoes. Mrs Chem was particularly impressed with how the children worked well in pairs.

Our science lesson involved a teacher demonstration on what happens to food in the stomach, small and large intestine. We put biscuits, banana, orange juice and water into the 'stomach' (a plastic bag) churned it all up. Then we poured the mixture into the small intestine (some tights) and squeezed all the nutrients out!





Year 5



YEAR 5

We learned all about where democracy came from in our history this week. We also learned that life was pretty different to now if you lived in Athens. If you were a man you were a citizen but everyone else didn't count!! Women were not even allowed to speak to men they were not related to. It sounded like a strange way to live! But it was really interesting!

In computing we have learnt what decomposition and abstraction are and how to take a real-life situation, decompose it and think about the level of abstraction.

We also voted for our school council, so not only did our learning include democracy we also took part in democracy! Luckily we didn't have to be men or over 18!





Year 6



This week in science, Year 6 have been learning about the bones in the body. The children identified the bones and labelled their own diagram of the skeleton with the correct scientific names for the bones, they discussed the importance of the skeleton as well as its functions. They learnt about the 3 types of joints: ball and socket, hinge and glide, and which bones are connected by which type of joint. For example, a hinge joint is found in the knees and elbow and only moves in one direction.



There are 3 types of joints in a human body, but some may be more flexible than others. These types are the ball and socket, hinge and gliding. For example, the ball and socket joint is the most flexible, and are found in the hip and shoulder. They can move in all directions. Another joint is the hinge, which can only move in one direction (like a door) and are found in your elbow and knee. Lastly, the third joint type is the glide, which only allows small movements. These are found in your ankles and wrists. Since everyone is different, the flexibility in all of these joints can change from person to person. In the wrists you may move your wrist in more than one direction, just in a limited way.

Extension

1. If you walked on all fours, yes you would be more stable, but less flexible. The reason for this is that when you walk normally you only have 2 legs on the floor, so if you pick one up, one will make you much less stable. If you walked with all fours when you pick one arm or leg up you would be just as stable.
2. Your arms are more rigid and smaller, so they may be more stable. Also, the hands are much more useful than feet.
